Activities Undertaken to Date:

- Cairns Fertility Centre participated in TropLinks Guam Trade Mission and met with President of the Medical Board

Barriers for Health Projects in Guam Identified by Group:

- Limited knowledge of the market for health services in Guam
- Limited funding available for public health services in Guam
- Cairns Fertility Centre needed to launch surgical services prior to further negotiations
- Only one public hospital with limited facilities and in need of refurbishment and expansion

Opportunities for Future Activities and Projects Identified:

- Cairns could become alternative location for IVF services, which are not covered by US health insurance (most clients currently go to the Philippines)
- Cairns could become alternative location for other day surgery procedures due to cost savings and proximity to Guam (patients currently often go to Hawaii or US)
- Obesity and diabetes is a significant public health issue due to high density of take away outlets, which could benefit from chronic disease management projects
- Dengue, malaria and other vector borne diseases a potential risk during construction associated with military build up, which could benefit from public health program
- Student placement programs could provide capacity building in Primary Health Care and augment existing services
- Need for environmental health services to address issues associated with recycling
- Potential to link with Pacific Islands Technical College

Further Information Needed:

- Health Needs Assessment to identify other significant health issues
- Clarification on upgrades planned by government for health services
- Demand for training of health professionals in Australia
- Level and capacity of existing Guam health workforce
- Existence if any of health related NGO's in Guam

- High morbidity and mortality associated with HIV and vector borne diseases to be addressed
- Centre for Oral Population Health student placements to provide programs
- Partnerships formed during Neglected Tropical Disease forum to be progressed
